One thing I want to remind everyone about in this increasingly litigious environment is the use of school email. Over the years we have been told for FERPA reasons to not put a student's name in the email heading. We have been told to put "student" or student initials. What everyone must be extremely conscience of is FOIL (Freedom of Information Law). Parents can and are using FOIL to obtain all district emails that reference their child. They can FOIL every email that has their student's name, initials or student id number. That is why it is extremely important that our emails are professional and do not contain any negative personal judgements that could be used against us in any type of disciplinary situation. When a foil request goes in for any initials, for example, "JT", all emails with those initials will be pulled out of the server and read through by administration. The emails that reference "JT' are then provided to the person who made the FOIL request. Please use caution and good judgement when using school email.

Lastly, I want to thank everyone who came out for the "Adopt a Highway" cleanup. We had a great turnout. It was also nice to see some faces from different buildings at the welcome back Happy Hour. We need to do that more often! As always, if you have any questions or concerns, don't hesitate to reach out!



I'm Marie Lysandrou, your Political Action Coordinator, and I'd like to pass along some important news. Early Voting has come to New York! For the first time, New York State residents may cast their votes up to 10 days in advance of Election Day. I've included the infographic to the left to help you determine convenient polling locations and other helpful information. This link will take you to a website which will advise you on polling places, available dates and times for all NY counties.

Did you know....

.... you are entitled to up to 3 paid hours during your workday to vote on 11/5/19? This must be either at the beginning or end of your day. Have your request into your building principal no later than October 31st specifying whether you are taking an AM or PM release. Nothing is needed in AESOP.

What is early voting?

Voting is easier and more convenient than ever before.

For the first time in New York State, you can vote in-person at seven different sites across Ulster County before Election Day on November 5th.

From Saturday, October 26, 2019 to Sunday, November 3, 2019 you can vote in person.


Can I vote early?

Yes, as long as you are registered to vote. Any registered voter can vote early.

How does early voting work?

Voting during early voting is the same as voting on Election Day. When you get to the early voting center, you will check in to vote, receive your ballot and vote as in any other election.

There will be instructions available at the early voting centers to familiarize you with the ballot. There will also be a notice to voter and bill of rights. You may ask an election inspector to explain how to vote, or if you need

If you vote during the early voting period, you are not eligible to vote on Election Day (November 5, 2019).

Early voting results will be canvassed and reported after 9:00pm on Tuesday, November 5, 2019.

Can I still vote by absentee ballot?

Yes! If you are out of Ulster County, or if you are permanently or temporarily disabled, ill or are the primary caregiver for one or more people who are ill or physically disabled, or a resident of a Veterans Hospital, or detained in jail awaiting Grand Jury action or incarcerated for an offense other than a felony you may apply for an absentee ballot.


